PTECs are a global network of educational and training establishments promoting collaborative initiatives and quality instruction to enhance capacity building, interoperability, and a comprehensive understanding of wider security issues.

## History

Initially launched in 1998, PTECs were formally established in 1999 under the Partnership for Peace programme to develop training and education activities with Euro-Atlantic partners. The PTEC community has grown to 31 members from countries in NATO, Partnership for Peace (PfP), the Mediterranean Dialogue (MD), and the Istanbul Cooperation Initiative (ICI).

## About PTEC

PTECs are nationally or multinationally sponsored education and training institutions which are united under a single concept that is endorsed by the North Atlantic Council and recognized by NATO. PTECs offer courses, seminars and workshops to civilian, police and military personnel, providing classroom and field education, training and instruction in diverse areas consistent with the objectives and priorities of NATO's policy on partnerships.
