

What is Global Programming?

Global Programming is how NATO manages the training needs of personnel from incredibly diverse backgrounds with the overall aim to provide tailored training solutions to satisfy all NATO posting requirements.

A NATO-specific training requirement is the expression of the difference between the skills, background, or technical ability taught in the national environment compared to what is needed to succeed in a posting within the NATO Command Structure or NATO Force Structure.

Why Global Programming?

With 30 member nations and 40 partners, military members and civilians joining NATO come from incredibly diverse backgrounds with different educational history. Global Programming ensures education and training focused on the particular needs of individuals assigned to NATO.

WHO DOES WHAT?

Requirements Authority

An operationally assigned officer who defines NATO Education and Training requirements and supports oversight and operation of the discipline.

Department Head

Translates training requirements into solutions across the training spectrum to include courses, e-learning, and on-the-job training.

Point of Contact

Staff Officer at ACT who supports the RA and DH through management of the Global Programming process and coordinates efforts across all disciplines.



HOW DOES IT WORK?

Strategic Training Plan

Defines the discipline and captures the overall plan for development and sustainment.

Training Requirements Analysis

Identifies performance requirements relating to a discipline. Compares existing solutions with requirements to determine gaps and overlaps.

Training Needs Analysis

Develops training solutions for identified gaps or emergent requirements.

Annual Discipline Conference

Yearly forum for ensuring education and training remains aligned with evolving needs, available technology, and resources.

Discipline Alignment Plan

Document capturing the results of the Annual Discipline Conference as of programme of work for the next year.
