 <u>the future</u> with renewed commitment and ambition.

Our world is evolving rapidly and we must be assertive in our ability to adapt at the right pace.

This adaptation finds its roots here in Norfolk, in Allied Command Transformation.

I want to pay tribute to the Allied and Partner Nations that send us the dedicated men and women serving in this Command.

They work every day to turn our vision into reality and thus allow our Alliance and all the Member Nations to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

We can achieve this because we work as a team, but also because of the outstanding support we receive from the people of the Hampton Roads area.

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Ceremonies were held with fluttering banners, pipes and drums and myriad uniforms, in a way very similar to what we have for you today.

- it is our turn to thank our yearlong hosts,
- our turn to honour fallen heroes,
- and our turn to draw inspiration from this kaleidoscope of flags.

These flags floating together around this plaza symbolize the mightiest military Alliance in the history of the world, based upon a strong and enduring transatlantic bond.

In closing, allow me to say a few words about a few American citizens who came to embody the Transatlantic Bond and personified the values of unity, trust, confidence in the future and friendship.

Just this week, a moving ceremony took part near Paris in which French and US authorities honoured the brave American pilots of the Lafayette squadron.

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These men, the first American fighter pilots, took part in the battles of World War One, winning many victories over France before the United States had even entered the war.

Their quest to build a safer and more peaceful Euro-Atlantic area, later gave birth to the reality of an Atlantic Alliance in 1949.

Our ceremony is therefore a reflection of our pride in this long heritage and of our firm desire to pass it on to future generations.
