Dear Lieutenant Colonel Klikovac, representing Montenegro,

My fellow ACT teammates,

We are gathered this morning to celebrate the official accession of Montenegro in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. This landmark moment is celebrated in every Allied Headquarters across the Euro-Atlantic space on this very day.

It is an honour and a privilege for me to officially welcome the twenty-ninth member nation of our Alliance among our ranks. It is also the outcome of a lengthy process, a demanding journey for this young, independent nation.

The Alliance has always had an open-door policy, as stated in the Article 10 of the North Atlantic Treaty.
